6. LANGUAGE KEEPERS: PRESERVING THE INDIGENOUS LANGUAGES OF THE PACIFIC

This conference at the National Library of Australia is both the closing event of its Cook and the Pacific Exhibition and the Library's first event in association with the 2019 International Year of Indigenous Languages.

Over two days, experts from Australia and the Pacific will reveal how European travellers recorded the languages of the Pacific, and how the revitalisation of Indigenous languages is supporting cultural practice and healing. The conference will be opened with a keynote address by award-winning writer Professor Kim Scott, focusing on his involvement with the Wirlomin Noongar Language and Stories Project.
